## Testimony from Bill McKinnon – Finance Chair

Christian Celtic tradition recognizes the concept of "thin places," places where we feel a particular closeness to God that creates a special feeling of home, peace, and safety. One such thin place is the island of Iona off the west coast of Scotland. Iona is considered the birthplace of Christianity in Scotland. St. Columba and 12 companions sailed across the Irish Sea to Iona in AD 567 to establish the first Christian church in Scotland. Missionaries from Iona then traveled throughout Scotland converting the Celts and Druids they encountered to Christianity. A church built in the 13<sup>th</sup> Century on the site of St. Columba's first church is home to a thriving 21<sup>st</sup> century Christian community there. Pilgrims have traveled to Iona for more than 1500 years to worship God and feel the peace of God's love there. I am one such pilgrim, and I discovered the overwhelming sense of God's presence in my life there.

But I don't have to travel to lona to find a thin place. For me, St. Paul UMC is such a thin place. I feel God's presence in my life whenever I am there. For me St. Paul UMC is a place where I feel loved, secure, welcomed, and part of a family; in other words, St. Paul UMC is home. So, I keep coming back to St. Paul UMC, as saints before me have done for more than 150 years, to where I feel at home in God's world. Because St. Paul is my church home, I will gratefully support its missions and ministries in 2023 by making a pledge of financial support so that St. Paul can continue the work we do and offering it to God on Giving Sunday, November 20.
